Blessing

Sh'heheyanu

Blessing of praise for first times
and joyous occasions

הַמּוֹצֵי אֵל

Hamotzi

Blessing over bread
and food

בִּרְכַּת הַמָּזוֹן

Birkat Hamazon

Grace/blessing of thanksgiving
after eating

הַבְּדֵלָה

Havdallah

Ceremony at the end of
Shabbat; “separation”

מִי שֶׁבֵרַךְ

Mi sheberakh

Blessing for those in need of healing; “one who blesses”

קַדִּישׁ

Kaddish

Prayer said in remembrance of those who died; also used as a divider between sections of a service as words of praise

רוֹשׁ חֹדֶשׁ

Rosh Hodesh

New Month, considered a minor holiday; “head of the month”

סְלִיחֹת

S'lihot

Service preceding Rosh Hashanah;
“forgiveness”

יִישָׁר כּוֹהֵךְ

yishar kohekh

colloquially pronounced: *yasher ko-hekh*

Statement made to a female in response to something done well, especially after a Torah reading or d'var Torah. Literally: "May your strength be made straight"

יִישָׁר כּוֹחַ

yishar ko-h'kha

colloquially pronounced: *yasher ko-ah*

Statement made to a male in response to something done well, especially after a Torah reading or d'var Torah. Literally: "May your strength be made straight"
